Sept 25th was a challenge to drive through a windy rainstorm and to try and navigate standing water on roadways; hard to avoid hydroplaning. The low tire light came on in the car in Franklin, NH. It was another challenge to find an air hose that actually worked. Finally I found an actual service station where they gave me the air for free. I made it to the **Dorr Wool Mill** and spent way too much money on wool applique patterns. Then it was on to *Keepsake Quilting*, in Center Harbor, NH where I spent more money. Then I stayed overnight with my cousin in Littleton, NH.

Sept 26th Drove to Errol, NH to spend the afternoon with a quilting friend and rode with her to attend their annual fall quilt supper, quilt show and 'show & tell' of my former quilt group. It is held in a church in Colebrook, NH. So many beautiful quilts and talented quilters. I always enjoy the stories of how their quilts came to be; some are pretty humorous. One lady had been traveling in Europe and bought fabric in London. But her fabric didn't make it home with her. It traveled to Rome, Italy and Germany before she got it back. This year they had a silent auction and I won 3 large bundles of wool for my growing interest in wool applique, not that I need more. My friend graciously hosted me overnight after the show.

Sept 27th I drove back to Littleton and had lunch with a VT cousin. She found out it was my birthday and gave me lunch as a birthday gift. Couldn't beat that! Once again, I stayed overnight with my Littleton cousin.

Sept 28th on the road back home, stopped at the **Quilt-Away Quilt Shop** in Westminster, VT. They have unique, easy-to-accomplish patterns, and I found a couple more from the last time I was here.
